

A Christmas Message from Fr Richard Rosse, PP

Friday 22nd December 2023

My dear people,

The time we have been waiting for since the start of Advent is here; the Celebration of the Nativity of our Lord is almost upon us. The birth of Jesus is the decisive event in the history of salvation and of humanity. The birth of the Son of God brings us joy because it represents the light which removes all darkness, especially the darkness of sin.

Sunday 24 December | 6pm, 8:30pm & 12 midnight (with carols sung half-an-hour before)

Monday 25 December | 9am & 10:30am only (No 12pm Mass or evening services)

This year has certainly had its own set of challenges throughout the world. We remember the situation in the Middle East with the war which is raging there. We keep in mind that the situation in Ukraine is still not resolved. We know also that many parts of the world are ravaged by war. On our own shores we remember the tragedies of floods experienced by people living in Cairns. These events are terrible tragedies for they totally upset the livelihoods of people. That upset is certainly accentuated when these events lead to the loss of lives. We remember the need to pray for the repose of the souls of all who have died this year and to pray for strength and courage for those who remain. We remember also particularly all those families which for the first time will have an empty seat at the table. In my own family, we lost three great aunts and one great

uncle since January, and we will feel the pain and loss of our loved ones.

Furthermore, we, disciples of Jesus, believe firmly that tragedies and evil are not the final word. The celebration of the birth of Jesus is an apt reminder that one day this child will suffer and die for us so that every tear will be wiped away. Once the tears are wiped and time starts diminishing the pain, we know that God will provide the strength and courage required to continue with our own pilgrimage. This certainty accompanies us in all parts of our lives, be it at our work or in our family and indeed in everything that makes up our lives.

While in no way diminishing the seriousness of the pain of loss, I thought that it would be good to think about our achievements as a parish community this year. This year, we have completed our tenth Alpha. Through Alpha, many people have gone deeper in their faith and have joined ministries as a way to serve God. Through our two catholic primary schools and the Society of Chistian Doctrine, more than 300 of our younger parishioners have either celebrated the Sacraments of Reconciliation or Confirmation or received Holy Communion for the first time. At the Easter Vigil, we have helped three parishioners complete their christian initiation.

"The words of Prophet Isaiah"

A Christmas message from Most Rev. Peter A. Comensoli Archbishop of Melbourne

Dear friends,

We hear these words from the ancient prophet Isaiah (52:7):

How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of the messenger who announces peace, who brings good news,

who announces salvation ...

These are beautiful words—old words, first spoken in old days, yet so sorely needed in our day!

Amid this time of conflict, suffering and exile, Isaiah speaks to us words of peace and the good news about the Prince of Peace.

Our hearts ache for reconciliation of peoples; respect for our shared humanity; care for our crying planet. Our world and its people seem to be groaning and railing against pathways to true peace.

Yet we experience the hope of God through simple words of joy, mercy and peace.

The shepherds experienced this. So did the Magi. Mary and Joseph knew it intimately.

God knew we needed his Son to come amongst us, to show us the way ahead.

As we come to celebrate the Nativity of the Lord this year, might we be attentive to the broken people across the world who are held captive by the tragedy of war and old hatreds.

Might we also remember those exiled in other ways—bereft of knowing God; lost and searching for identity and purpose.

We too can be the messengers whose footfalls bring light into the world, announcing mercy, bringing joy, offering Good News.

God has come among us, simply, humbly and hopefully in a little child, his Son, our Brother.

May the peace that comes through this child, the Prince of Peace, be with you this Christmas.

And with every footstep, may you take His message, and life, out into the world.

The Season of Christmas

hristmas is one of the most important days of the Church year, second only to Easter itself. It is the feast of the incarnation, the feast of God becoming flesh (the Latin "in carne" means "enfleshment").



It is a uniquely Christian teaching, the Divine choosing to become one of us. Because of this belief, God is not only Transcendent, but also wholly Immanent, Emmanuel (Godwith-us). While remaining Transcendent (meaning we must rise above our present condition to reach Him, He is at the same time Immanent (meaning He is with us as we rise toward Him). Every Eucharist is like Christmas where the bread and wine are transformed into His flesh, His Body and Blood, and, in a sense, He is born anew on the altar.

The liturgical season of Christmas begins with the vigil Masses on Christmas Eve and concludes on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. During this season, we celebrate the birth of Christ into our world and into our hearts, and reflect on the gift of salvation that is born with him... including the fact that he was born to die for us.


1st FRIDAY MASS on 5 JANUARY 2024



My dear people, Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year for 2024.




