

A Christmas Message from Fr Richard Rosse, PP

Tuesday 24th December 2024

My dear people,

It is interesting to note that every year around this time we experience the same sort of excitement. I guess it is because we realise that the end of the year is drawing very near, and the approach of the new year represents a bit of a reset to which we all look forward. The excitement is also due to Christmas, the celebration of the Birth of Our Lord; the celebration we have been waiting for since the start of Advent. The birth of Jesus is the decisive event in the history of salvation and of humanity. The birth of the Son of God brings us joy and peace because it represents the light which removes all darkness, especially the darkness of sin.

Tuesday 24 December | 5pm, 7pm, 9pm & 12 midnight (with carols sung half-an-hour before)

Wednesday 25 December | 8:30am & 10:30am only (No 12:30pm Mass or evening services)

This year has certainly had its own set of challenges throughout the world. We remember parts the world being ravaged by war particularly the situation in the Middle East, in Ukraine, in Sudan and so many other areas. There have been many natural disasters as well around the world and one very close to us in Vanuatu, only last week. Let us spare a thought and pray particularly for all those families who for the first time will have an empty seat at the table. These are to be acknowledged because they remind us that

unfortunately, there is evil and suffering in the world, and they cause tears to be shed.

However, we, disciples of Jesus, believe firmly that tragedies and evil are not the final word. The celebration of the birth of Jesus is an opportune reminder that one day this child will suffer and die for us so that every tear will be wiped away. Once the tears are wiped and time starts diminishing the pain, we know that God will provide the strength and courage required to continue with our own pilgrimage. This certainty accompanies us in all parts of our lives, be it at our work or in our family and indeed in everything that makes up our lives.

While in no way diminishing the seriousness of the pain of loss, I thought that it would be good to think about our achievements as a parish community this year. Firstly, we completed our eleventh Alpha. Through Alpha, many people deepened their faith while others re-discovered the beauty of their faith, and many have joined ministries as a way to serve God. Through our two catholic primary schools and the Society of Chistian Doctrine, more than 300 of our younger parishioners have celebrated the Sacraments of either Reconciliation, Confirmation or received Holy Communion for the first time. Dear friends,

Over recent weeks, much attention has been drawn to the window displays in the heart of Melbourne's CBD. These displays have sparked conversations about their social history and the tradition they represent for families. At the same time, they've prompted reflections on the suffering caused by global conflicts, urging us to look at ourselves in our local settings.

This year, the windows feature a variety of displays, with a theme of animals and nature. However, one window stands out. It depicts a mother and a father hovering attentively over their newborn child. In this moment, they have found shelter and security, a place of refuge and safety from their struggles. They are together, united in a joyful love, at peace with each other, and resting in the grace that surrounds them.

We all know this scene, even if for some, the gift it represents has become hidden. In the midst of what may be a commercial display, this simple image reminds us of a promise that transcends time and place. Mary, Joseph, and the baby Jesus are there, inviting us into their lives. Hope springs from this image; peace is at its heart. The Holy Family speaks to us of hope and joy in new life—to each of us in our own local families. The child points us to where peace can be found—especially for the world beyond us.

Here in Melbourne, we await this Christmas knowing far too many are suffering in the throes of war internationally, and struggle at home. As we look to that humble family from Bethlehem, how might we give special attention to how we live with all our brothers and sisters as a holy family?

Families, of course, are not always easy places to be, and they require a daily practice of love and self-giving, patience and respect, attentiveness and forgiveness. As we see the loving gaze of Mary and Joseph on their Child, who is our Saviour, might we lift up a humble prayer, asking that God's love and mercy surround us, and Christ's peace and compassion flourish among us. May you have a hope-filled and peaceful Christmas.

The Season of Christmas

hristmas is one of the most important days of the Church year, second only to Easter itself. It is the feast of the incarnation, the feast of God becoming flesh (the Latin "in carne" means "enfleshment").



It is a uniquely Christian teaching, the Divine choosing to become one of us. Because of this belief, God is not only Transcendent, but also wholly Immanent, Emmanuel (Godwith-us). While remaining Transcendent (meaning we must rise above our present condition to reach Him, He is at the same time Immanent (meaning He is with us as we rise toward Him). Every Eucharist is like Christmas where the bread and wine are transformed into His flesh, His Body and Blood, and, in a sense, He is born anew on the altar.

The liturgical season of Christmas begins with the vigil Masses on Christmas Eve and concludes on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. During this season, we celebrate the birth of Christ into our world and into our hearts, and reflect on the gift of salvation that is born with him... including the fact that he was born to die for us.


1st FRIDAY MASS on 3 JANUARY 2025




